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Sustainable Health Care

Work I am proudest of

I worked on the living conditions of people with intellectual disability (ID) in Ireland, working with people with ID, their families and service providers.

We looked together at good and bad practices in supporting the move from big institutions into more appropriate housing in their communities.

I will support a rights based service culture for people with Intellectual Disability, giving them more control over their lives.

SOPHIE

Special Olympics Ireland (SOI) provides a vital social outlet for many people with ID here. I was a volunteer at the World Games in Croke Park in 2003.

I am working with SOI to show, and quantify, how their work benefits their members, their families, and the country. This is the economic evidence needed to argue for continued investment in SOI.

Health service information systems

I designed, and got the original funding for the Irish Health Atlas, now the main planning tool used within HSE. It is built on an Open source platform.

In 2013 and 2014 I worked on a strategy for modernising the IT systems in the Irish health service.

This includes plans for privacy, and data security, individual health identifiers, common financial and clinical information systems, with links to GP systems.
